Elder C. B. Massey 1867 - 1957

Our files and source of information does not give the names of Bro. C. B. Massey's parents and place of birth, which was probably Macon County, Tennessee. Elder Captain Buie Massey, known to the thousands of his friends as "C. B." or 'Cap' Massey was born June 16, 1867.

He was saved on January 11, 1888, at Rocky Mound Missionary Baptist Church, Macon County, Tenn. In November 1896, he united with this church and was baptized into her fellowship by Elder Joe S. Meador. He was ordained to the full-work of the gospel ministry by Rocky Mound church on June 10, 1899.

Bro. Massey was married to Miss Effie Hanes in 1890, and to this union were born to Fannie Graves and to them were born two sons. She too was called from him in death. His third marriage was to Maggie Barham, and after her death he was married to the widow of Elder H. C. Oldham, Sister Thulie Oldham, who also preceded him in

THE PERSONALITY AND DEITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

By J. M. Pendleton, D.D. 1811 - 1891

The subject discussed in the preceding chapter (The Deity of Christ) may be considered in some of its aspects the most important and vital in the system of theology. It is therefore wise to establish by conclusive proofs the Deity of Christ. When this is done, the doctrine of the Trinity is usually accepted without hesitation, while personality and divinity are accorded to the Holy Spirit. This being the case, it will be unnecessary for the subject of this chapter to receive a very elaborate investigation, but it should by no means be passed over. It divides itself into two parts:

1. THE PERSONALITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. By this is meant that the Spirit is a person, not a mere energy or influence or operation, but an intelligent person. What does Jesus say? "And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever:" "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things." John 14:16, 26,

The Comforter here promised is said to be the Holy Spirit, and the plain meaning of the term is, one who administers comfort. This is clearly suggestive of personality; but if stronger proof is required, it is found in the fact that the Spirit is said to teach. Surely the office of teacher is inseparable from personality. When it is said of the Spirit, "He shall teach you all things," it is virtually declared that he is a person. The baptismal commission furnishes as strong proof of the personality

MEMORY SELECTION: And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. (Acts 2:4).

INTRODUCTION

It is natural to assume a purpose in the divine choice of the day on which the church was to receive the promise of God. That day may have been determined, if one may so speak, either in view of the circumstances of the feast, or of its history and symbolic fitness.

Of all the feasts of the Jewish year, it was that which attracted the largest number of pilgrims from distant lands. The dangers of travel by sea and land in the early spring or late autumn prevented their coming in any large numbers to the Passover or the Feast of Tabernacles. At no other feast would there have been representatives of so many nations. So, it may be noted, it was the Feast of Pentecost that Paul went up to keep once and again, during his mission work in Greece and Asia. (Acts 18:21; Acts 20:16).

So far, then, there was no time on which the gift of the Spirit was likely to produce such direct and immediate results. Each aspect of the old Feast of Weeks, now known as Pentecost, or the "Fiftieth-day" Feast, presented a symbolic meaning which made it, in greater or less measure, typical of the work now about to be accomplished. It was the "feast of harvest, the feast of the firstfruits;" and so it was meet that it should witness the first great gathering of the fields that were white to harvest.

It was one on which, more than on any other, the Israelite was to remember that he had been a bondman in the land of Egypt. and had been led forth to freedom. (Deut. 16:12). On this Feast day they were to do no servile work. (Lev. 23:31). Therefore, it was a fit time for the gift of the Spirit, of whom it was emphatically true that "where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty.' (II Cor. 3:17). The Spirit was also to lead them into all truth which indeed was to make men free, (John 7:32).

It was a day on which sacrifices of every kind were offered, burnt offerings, sin offerings, meat offerings and peace offerings, and so represented the consecration of body, soul and spirit as a spiritual sacrifice, (Lev. 23:17-20). As on the Passover the first ripe sheaf of corn was waved before Jehovah as the type of the sacrifice of Christ, of the corn of wheat which is not quickened except it die, (Lev. 23:10; John 12:24).

This March the Hendersonville Missionary Baptist Church will celebrate her eleventh (11) anniversary, being organized in March 1968. Eld. Robert Gregory being the minister who labored to bring the church together. The majority of the members came from Parkwood Missionary Baptist Church, of which Eld. Gregory was then a member.

Hendersonville Church sponsors a radio broadcast each Sunday morning over W.A.M.G. radio in Gallatin, Tenn. The program airs at 8:00 A.M. - 1130 on the dial. Bro. Huntsman and Bro. Faulkner also conduct a service on the same station. Bro. Huntsman each Sunday 9:00 A.M. and Bro. Faulkner each second Sunday at 8:30 A.M. The other ministers are active in appointments and revival work.

of the Holy Spirit as of that of the Father and of the Son. "Baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." The phrase "in the name" usually means "by authority of," and if this is the meaning here, the authority of the Spirit is equal to that of the Father and of the Son, and the Spirit must be a person.

But this is not the meaning of "in the name" in the commission. Baptism is administered by authority of the Son, but, as it seems to me, "into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit;" that is, there is an avowal of allegiance and consecration to the three persons of the Godhead; there is a profession of fellowship with God in his three-fold unity. The personality of the Spirit is undoubtedly implied, for it would be absurd to associate an influence or energy with the Father and the Son in the ordinance of baptism.

The Spirit has equal personality with the Father and the Son. To confirm the view now presented, I may say that the Spirit is referred to as doing what a personal agent alone can do. He is said to "testify" of Christ, to "glorify" him, to make "intercession for the saints," to distribute gifts "as he will," to "will," and to "seal." It is morally certain that the Holy Spirit is a Person.

II. THE DEITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. Not more evident is the personality than the divinity of the Holy Spirit. This will appear in view of such facts as these:

1. He is called God. "But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and to keep back part of the price of the land?... Thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God." Acts 5: 3-4. Here it is plain that to lie to the Holy Spirit is to lie to God. But why is it so? Because the Holy Spirit is God. The change which Peter interrogatively makes is, that Ananias had lied to the Holy Spirit; and to show the greatness of the sin he said it was lying to God, the term God being no doubt better understood by the guilty man than the phrase Holy Spirit.

'Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you?" I Cor. 3:16. The temple at Jerusalem was God's house, and he was said to dwell there, Availing himself of this form of speech, Paul told the members of the Corinthian church that they were the temple of God - that is, his habitation. What else does he say? "Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost?" I Cor. 6:19. We have, therefore, in the same Epistle the expressions "temple of God" and "temple of the Holy Ghost" applied to the same church. If a church or an individual Christian is the temple of God and the temple of the Holy Spirit, it must be because the Holy Spirit is God.

2. Divine perfections are ascribed to the Holy Spirit. If these perfections, when ascribed to Christ, prove his Deity, they also, when ascribed to the Spirit, prove his Deity. That the Spirit is represented as eternal, omniscient, omnipresent, and omnipotent is manifest from the following passages: "How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?" Heb. 9:14. "But God hath revealed them to us by his Spirit: for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God." I Cor. 2:10. "Whither shall

to all ministers, he served as moderator of Enon Baptist Association for 40 years.

He died at his home in Pleasant Shade, Tenn. on October 18, 1957, and was buried in the Dixon Springs Cemetery, Smith County, Tenn.

I am using books for my study and ministry now that Bro. Massey gave to me around thirty years ago when I was a young preacher. We have letters that he wrote to me, to my wife, and to our son, Bobby, while he was still unsaved, instructing him to keep seeking the Lord until he was saved. He told my wife, Alta, what an important work she had in being a preacher's wife and the place she was filling. He gave me many important helps as he had to hundreds of young ministers.

He had filled his appointment at Faith Missionary Baptist Church on 10th Street, Bowling Green, Kentucky on Sunday, Oct. 13, 1957. He wasn't feeling well and came back to his home in the afternoon. I was living in Bowling Green at the time and went to fill his appointment that night. I wrote him a letter the next day, sending him an offering, and when I heard of his death the following Friday, I went down to visit the family and learned he had answered my letter the day before his death. The day after I attended his funeral service, I received his letter.



than they ask for. He was able to do that, He wanted to do it, and He did it.

The case of Solomon is one outstanding example. God appeared to Solomon, when

he had just been made king of Israel, and said to him, "Ask what I will give thee." II Chronicles 1:7. And King Solomon answered, "Give me now wisdom and knowledge, that I may go out and come in before this people; for who can judge this thy people, that is so great." II Chronicles 1:10. Now, it is worthy of note to look at the way he asked, first of all, because his was an humble and unselfish prayer. He asked for wisdom and knowledge that he would be able to judge God's people. He didn't ask for riches, wealth, honor or long life, but God gave him all of these and more, yes and of course the wisdom and knowledge that he asked for. God gave Solomon much more than he asked for.

Another outstanding example of this thought in scripture which I would like to call attention to, is the thief on the cross. This thief was being crucified for the crimes that he had committed, & there was another man being crucified right next to him for offences that He had never committed, He was dying for the sins of others, and His name was Jesus. The name of the thief is not given. This thief realized his condemnation and that he was going out into eternity without hope. So he turned to Jesus and said, 'Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. Luke 23:42; "And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, Today thou shalt be with me in paradise." Luke 23:43. This thief only asked Jesus that He would remember him when He came into His kingdom, but Jesus said you will be with me today in paradise. So the Lord gave him more than he asked for.

May I call your attention to the Samaritan woman. Jesus was traveling through Samaria and came to Jacob's well and sat down, the woman of Samaria came to draw water, and Jesus asked her for a drink. She refused at first, asking Jesus why it was He being a Jew asking her for a drink, she being a Samaritan. "Jesus answered and said unto her, If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink: thou wouldest have asked of him. and he would have given thee living water.' John 4:10. And Jesus says in verse 14, That those who drink of the water that He gives shall have in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life. He is saying that not only do you drink but you will have in you a well of water. Ask for a drink and you get a well of water. We get more than we ask for; when the asking is from the heart and with faith.

HE DOES MORE THAN WE THINK

God knows our needs better than we do, and sometimes it is difficult for us to express ourselves before Him, because our own thinking is so limited, human thoughts are just too shallow to fathom the depths of our needs. So He can go beyond our thinking and grant to us what we really need. His Holy Spirit helps us in this situation, that is in our human weaknesses, He helps our infirminities and makes intercession for us according to the will of God. "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities for we know not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." Romans 8:26.

How true it is in our own experiences that we try to pray and just don't know how and what to pray for as we ought, but the blessed Holy Spirit takes us up and begins to help us, and from there we begin to really pray.

CONCLUSION

Most people in this world are living their lives without asking God for anything: evidently they think that He doesn't have anything to give them, or that He is not able to help them. The reason for this in many instances is due to that lack of teaching, somebody is failing to do their job of teaching. However, on the other hand there are people who would just like to be left alone to live their own lives, to get what they can by any means of getting it, and leave God out altogether. But God is so rich and unselfish with what He has! and how He would be so pleased to give to those who would ask! The Bible says, "Ye have not, because ye ask not." James 4:2. Jesus said, "Ask and it shall be given you; seek, and ve shall find: knock, and it shall be opened unto you." The day will come when men will ask, they will call, they will seek, they will knock, they will cry, weep and wail, but the door will be shut. Too late, the Master will not hear. He will not give. Why not call upon Him while the door of mercy is

I go from thy Spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? Psalm 139:7. "Being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit." "He that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you." I Peter 3:18; Rom 8:11. As the attributes of eternity, omniscience, omnipresence, and omnipotence belong inalienably to God, and as they are ascribed to the Holy Spirit, the conclusion is irresistible that he is God.

3. Divine operations are ascribed to the Spirit. The most prominent of these operations are connected with creation and the working of miracles. "The earth was without form and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters." Gen. 1:2. Order and beauty were brought out of chaotic darkness by the Spirit; and in Job 26:13, we read, "By his Spirit he hath garnished the heavens." These two passages sufficiently show the Spirit's connection with the work of creation, and by consequence his Deity. As to miracles, it is written, "But if I cast out devils by the Spirit of God, then the kingdom of God is come unto you." "For to one is given, by the Spirit, the word of wisdom: ...to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit; to another the working of miracles." Matt. 12:28: I Cor. 12:8-10.

A miracle is a supernatural work which no created being can perform and therefore the working of miracles by the Holy Spirit proves him to be divine. The "laws of Nature," as they are called, God has established, and he alone can suspend them; but as a miracle is a suspension of some law of Nature, the Holy Spirit in working miracles vindicates his claim to divinity.

I may say also that what is said of blasphemy against the Holy Spirit furnishes conclusive proof of his Deity: "All sins shall be forgiven unto the sons of men, and blasphemies wherewithsoever they shall blaspheme: but he that shall blaspheme against the Holy Ghost hath never forgiveness, but is in danger of eternal damnation: because they said. He hath an unclean spirit." Mark 3:28-30. The intimation here seems to be that ascribing an evil spirit to Christ and saying that his miracles were wrought by such a spirit, and not by the Spirit of God, was blaspheming against the Holy Spirit. This sin was not to be forgiven, and this fact implies the divinity of the Holy Spirit.

That is, if the Holy Spirit is not divine, we cannot see why a sin committed against him cannot be forgiven, especially as sins against the Father and the Son are forgiven. There is of course something peculiar in blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, rendering it unpardonable, but the peculiarity, so far as we can judge, is inseparable from Deity of the Spirit.

It will be seen that I prefer the phrase Holy Spirit to Holy Ghost, though they are of the same import. The chief reason for the preference is that Spirit is a more familiar word than Ghost, and is therefore better understood, to say nothing of associations connected with the latter term. It is a singular fact that "Holy Ghost" is not to be found in the Old Testament, though it occurs frequently in the New.

There has been some curiousity felt as to the more frequent application of the epithet "Holy" to the Spirit than to the Father and the Son. As there is in the three

persons of the Godhead equality of nature, there must be equality of holiness. The holiness is infinite, and in the infinite there are no degrees. The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are equally and perfectly holy. It follows, therefore, that the Spirit is emphatically called Holy to denote official distinction. In other words, the Spirit is termed Holy because it is his office to make

It is his work to deposit the germ of holiness in the sinful heart of man. There is no holiness in any human heart till the Holy Spirit produces it. The germ of holiness implanted in regeneration is developed in sanctification; which is, equally with regeneration, the work of the Spirit. The third person in the Godhead is designated the Holy Spirit because he renovates the soul, purifies it, and prepares it for heaven.

THE CHURCH BAPTIZED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT

On this day the promise that had been made was fulfilled. Jesus had told His disciples, "And behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high." (Luke 24:49).

In verses 1-4 of this lesson we note three things that occured. First, something audible: "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled the house where they were sitting." Second, something visible: "And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them.' Third, a result: "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

It is believed that this took place in the upper chamber where Jesus had eaten the Passover meal with the disciples and following that He had instituted the Lord's Supper, and where He had appeared unto the disciples a number of times after His resurrection, (John 20:19-26).

PETER EXPLAINS WHAT IS HAPPENING

Since verses 5 through 13 are not included in the lesson, you will have a better understanding of the lesson if you study them along with the others. Peter explains what is happening after God's people had been accused of being drunk. The appeal is made to the common standard of right feeling. Drunkness belonged to the night, (I Thess. 5:7). It was a mark of extremest baseness for men to "rise up early in the morning that they may follow strong drink.' (Isaiah 5:11). Were the disciples likely to be drunk at 9 A.M., and that on the Day of Pentecost, after a night spent in devotion, and when all decent Jews were fasting? The prophecy of Joel takes its place. The

people were suffering from one of the locust plagues of the East and its consequent famine. The prophet calls them to repentance, and promises this gift of the Spirit as the great blessing of a far-off future. He had been taught that no true knowledge of God comes but through that Spirit. Elisha prayed that a double portion (that is, the eldest son's inheritance) of the Spirit which God had given to Elijah might rest upon him.

(II Kings 2:9).

We now notice verses 17 through 21. Those mentioned are the sons, the daughters, the young men, the old men, the servants and the handmaidens. The words imply that women as well as men had been filled with the Spirit. The "visions" implying the full activity of spiritual power, are thought of as belonging to the younger prophets. In the calmer state of more advanced age, wisdom came, as in the speech of Elihu, "in a dream, in visions of the night, when deep sleep falleth upon men." (Job 33:15).

This was the culminating point of the joyous prediction. Not on priests only, or those who had been trained in the schools of the prophets, but on slaves, male and female, should that gift be poured by Him who was no respector of persons. The great and terrible day of the Lord as seen by the prophet had come. It was terrible to the enemies of God, but a day of blessing to those who were redeemed through the Saviour of all men, especially those who believed.

We note in verse 22 that "whosoever" includes people of all nations, races and tongues. By studying John 3:16; Isaiah 55:1-7; Heb. 2:9; II Peter 3:9; Rev. 7:9-10. you will better understand the will of God and His plan of salvation for all humanity.
