(Continued from February issue) WAS THE ATONEMENT NECESSARY?

On this question I am not to be understood as intimating that God was under obligation to provide an atonement, or that there was an absolute necessity for Adam's race to be saved. There was a perfect exemption from obligation on the part of God, as is seen in the fact that GRACE reigned in providing the atoning sacrifice. 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
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
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Elder Fountain L. Ray 1907 - 1978

EDITOR'S NOTE: (Elder F. L. Ray was one of our most devoted Baptist ministers during his ministry, in preaching, writing, debating, Bible Teaching, etc. He passed away on November 4, 1978. He had also taught in each annual session of the Old Union Baptist Ministers School, Bowling Green, Ky., 1973 - 1978. In 1974, he wrote three articles to the BAPTIST BANNER on Ministerial Education. Since this month is the time for the 9th annual session of the Old Union Baptist Ministers School, and since Bro. Ray loved the school and devoted much time and effort to it, I wanted to republish his articles (3 in 1) this month in tribute to him).

I have just passed my thirtysixth year in the ministry, I am both looking backward and foreward. I am thinking of statements that I have heard, things that have been been said and done through these years many things I have heard have been of great help to me. But on the other hand I have heard things that has made me wonder, and sometimes I become disturbed. What I would like to do is to help all I can both the old and young preacher. We

shall never get too old to learn, nor will we learn so much that we will not need to study.

For example I heard a preacher say who had been in the ministry for some time when he was presented to preach. (I have not studied any today. I have no sermon layed out. I want to read one verse of Scripture, I don't know why God put this scripture on my mind. I am going to preach just what he gives me to preach. Brethren, I believe that God will help us through his Holy Spirit, I believe he will give wisdom of understanding, but I don't believe he will give any one a sermon or put words in the mouth of his preachers. The following scriptures will prove my position without any doubt. First I know that the following scripture is quoted by many to prove or that he are many to prove or try to prove that we are just ignorant men and unlearned. "Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus.) Acts: 4:13

the eternal throne of God would have remained bright and God would have remained just with no suspicion of injustice would have attached to the divine administration.

By the necessity of atonement is

meant this: That it was indispensable to a consistent exercise of mercy toward condemned sinners, and therefore without it there could have been no salvation for them. It is proper, however, to say that the atonement of Christ was not necessary to excite the love of God to man, for it is the effect, and not the cause, of God's love. Remember, Jesus said to Nicodemus, "God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16. It is plain from this scripture as well as others that the love of God was the originating cause of Atonement. There was love in the divine bosom and compassion for lost men, but without an atonement that love could not consistently with law and justice, express itself in the salvation of sinners; that compassion, no matter how strong, could have no development. It is incorrect, therefore, to say that the atone of Christ rendered God propitious to sinners, and stop there; but it is strictly true to say that it rendered him propitious to sinners according to law and justice. The law, having been trangressed, demanded the execution of its penalty, and justice concurred in the demand. The law being "holy, and just and good," holiness, and justice, and goodness all combined and required the infliction of its curse. The law then, having been violated, rose up in its terrible majesty, and restrained the exercise of divine mercy in man's salvation and called for the execution of its penalty. At this point the necessity of an atonement clearly appears. In order to the salvation of sinners an expiatory measure must be introduced into the divine government to meet the claims of the law, by preserving its honor and vindicating its penal sanctions. Justice required the introduction of such a measure or execution of the penalty of the law on personal transgressors. The atonement of Christ was the measure introduced. It rendered satisfaction to the law and the justice of God, and removed the restraints which they had placed on the exercise of It harmonized the divine mercy. perfections in the salvation of sinners. This is the glory of redemption through the blood of the cross. Let us never overlook the co-operation of the divine attributes in the salvation of the guilty. MERCY TRIUMPHS IN ALL ITS GLORY; JUSTICE SHINES FORTH IN ALL ITS MAJESTY: HOLINESS APPEARS IN ALL ITS BEAUTY: WHILE WISDOM, IN DEVISING THE WONDROUS PLAN, EXHIBITS ITSELF TO INFINITE ADVANTAGE. IN CON-SIDERATION OF THE NECES-ATONEMENT THE OF SITY OF CHRIST IT IS GENERALLY DEEMED SUFFICIENT TO REFER TO IT AS SATISFYING THE LAW AND THE JUSTICE OF GOD. WHEN THIS IS DONE, THE INTERESTS OF TRUTH ARE NOT LIKELY TO SUFFER.

The penalty of violated law must fall either on the transgressor himself or on his substitute. It must fall somewhere. If the sinner is punished in person, both the spirit and the letter of the law are carried into effect; if his iniquity is laid upon a voluntary substitute, though the letter of the law is dispensed with, its spirit is fully preserved. If the transgressor bears his own iniquity, there is, of course, no pardon; if the substitute bears it, the transgressor may be pardoned and go free. The iniquity must be borne. The necessity of atonement, therefore, arises from the fact that while the pardon of sin is indispensable to salvation, sin is so great an evil, and so justly deserving of punishment, as to be for ever unpardonable without an expiatory sacrifice.

But the necessity of atonement is traceable from the nature of sin to the nature of God. It can be traced no further. All reasoning on the subject is destined to culminate at this point, and here to exhibit its supreme strength. For if we ask why the law of God is what it is, the answer is, because the nature of God is what it is. If we ask why sin is such an evil as to deserve punishment, the answer is, because it is antagonistic to the nature of God. Here. therefore - in the divine nature - is the field in which is to be decided the contest for or against the necessity of atonement. All theories which teach that the aspects of Christ's atonement are manward and not Godward virtually deny the justice and holiness of God. The correct view is that the atonement has reference both to God and man. Its saving influence reaches man, because its propitiatory merit first reaches the throne of God. It is idle, therefore, to talk of what the atonement can do for man, unless it does something for the government of God.

THE VALUE OF THE ATONEMENT

Let us here contrast the value of all the beastly sacrifices offered from Abel through the period of the law of Moses. To measure the value by the material worth of all animals whose blood was shed as the type of the shed blood of Christ the figure would be enormous. Yet, all the blood of all the animals combined could never take away sin, but served only as a figure of the shed blood of the Lamb of God, God's only begotten Son. Every altar sent its blood and smoke in the direction of Calvary. The many victims pointed to ONE victim. In all of the offerings of sacrifices for four thousand years, the purpose of God was to direct the attention of everyone to the sacrifice of His Son. Therefore the death of Christ, in His one and only sacrifice to make atonement to God once and for all is of uncountable worth. When Jesus died, the type yielded to the antitype and the shadow to the substance. It follows that the atoning sacrifice of Christ was the consummation of all sacrifices. Since there can be no type without an antitype and no shadow without a substance, the antitype and the substance (Christ) was standing as the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world. Paul tells us that Adam was the figure of him that was to come, so he of whom Adam was only a figure had to have prior existance to Adam.

The strongest argument in favor of the value of the Atonement of Christ is not that he was divinely appointed because under the law animals were divinely appointed for sacrifice. The greatest proof of the value of Christ's atonement is His character, which animals did not possess. The sufferer of Calvary is the God-man, the Christ. All the majestic glories of

Supreme Deity and all the excellences of sinless humanity belong to him. It was the union of divinity and the humanity in the person of Christ that gave atoning merit to the blood he shed on the cross. While suffering and death are to be restricted to the human nature of Christ, we may well rejoice in the belief that his divinity imparted infinite worth to the sufferings and blood and death of his humanity. Thus the atonement was made. Nor is there anything to forbid the belief that the atoning agonies of Jesus possess as great value as if his divinity had been capable of suffering and had really suffered. The merits of his death grow out of the divine element in the twofold constitution of his person. Were this element abstracted, his death would be nothing more than a martyr's death, whereas the Scriptures represent it as an atoning death. In this aspect it is unlike all other deaths, it is unique, and clothed with a glory all its own. Now, if the worth of Christ's sacrifice arises chiefly from the dignity of his person, while the dignity of his person grows out of his divinity, and is inseparable from it, who can set limits to the value of his atonement when divinity is the chief factor in the creation of that value? Must it not be by a sublime logical necessity, infinite? Must not its merits be exhaustless? It cannot be too earnestly insisted on that the strongest proof of the value of Christ's atonement is furnished by the dignity of his person as the God-man; and this suggests by contrast the worthlessness of those schemes of theology, so called, which deny the Deity of Christ. A denial of this fundamental truth leads to a denial of the doctrine of atonement. For if Christ is not divine, he could not become the Substitute for sinners, and substitution is indispensable to atonement. To reject the divinity of Jesus is a virtual rejection of every truth pertaining to a sinner's salvation. The acknowledgement of Thomas was, "My Lord, and My God."

THE EXTENT OF THE ATONEMENT

I only have time left to briefly present the reach of the atonement, and lest my time should run out. I want to stress this truth. We must either acknowledge an objective fulness in the atonement of Christ for the salvation of the whole world, were the whole world to believe in him, or, in opposition to Scripture and common sense, confine our invitations to believe to such persons as have believed already. The sufficiency of the provisions of the atonement for the salvation of all the world is the only doctrine which harmonizes with the commission of Christ to the apostles; "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature; he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Mk. 16:16. According to this scripture, salvation through the gospel, is to be offered to all men, or the whole human family. But the fearful intimation is that some will not believe, and through unbelief will incur damnation. It must then be the duty of all to believe. Faith is said to be "in his blood", that is, it involves reliance on the atonement made by his blood. If then, it is the duty of all men to believe, and if faith implies reliance on the atonement, and if the atonement was made for a part of

the race only, it follows that it is the duty of those for whom no atonement was made to rely on that which has no existence. This is an absurdity. Now if Christ did not die for all, and if it is the duty of all to believe in him, it is the duty of some -those for whom he did not die - to believe an untruth. This also reduces the matter to an absurdity, for it cannot be the duty of anyone to believe that which is not true. We must either give up the position that it is the duty of all men to believe the gospel, or admit that the atonement of Christ has reference to all men.

Such is the extent of the atonement, that salvation is offered to all men; nor dare we question God's sincerity in making the offer. While the atoning merit of the blood of Christ is infinite, its saving efficacy is restricted to its application. We may therefore say of the atonement that it is so general that all are saved who "come to God" by Christ, and so limited that none are saved who do not "come to God" through the Mediator, "the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself a ranson for all." I Timothy 2:5,6.

Since our last financial report we have been supported by 65 churches intermittently, supported by 22 churches on regular basis, and a number of different individuals.
