Dear Elder H. C. Vanderpool;

Thank you sending me the Banner every month by air mail. The other day I put some articles into Japanese out of new farmated June issue, and put them on the bulletin board like I did many a time. They are welcomed by our people. Your paper has helped our believers in many ways. We pray that Lord bless all of your work for the Lord and people.

Lord has blessed our work testifying Jesus Christ to the pagan people of this land, for which we are thankful. We had six new adults attended to our Sunday morning preaching service this month. We understand Lord has led them come to our services. Let me tell you of them. Otsubo, an old woman; Ishizu's son, (Ishizu is a Lutheran, but comes to us occasionally as he likes our services. He brought his son to let him hear my sermon on salvation in Jesus); Tamamoto, a student of business school; and three high school girls. Miss Tamamoto is the most sincere person to the words of God. The attendance is increasing. We have 25 adults in average in the morning services. This is something great in this land. We need your prayer very much.

Three Sundays ago we had a good picnic in the afternoon. which was purposed for Sunday School children and their parents, especially for parents. They send their children to our school, but don't come themselves except special events. That is what Japanese do. We chartered a bus to take us to the Hiroshima Botanical Park. The parents took part in this picnic were rather young people, and without exception they had problems and problems. It goes without saying, without having the Saviour no one has peace in his soul. So this was a good chance to talk with them personally, and to testify the Lord Jesus. I found a man in the picnic who used turn his face whenever I see him on the street. He is opening his heart. I wondered why I did not think of this kind of way to reach people more earlier.

My family and I are in good health condition, for which we are thankful. We still have cool

summer. Last weekend I fixed water pump which was frozed to burst in the cold winter, that was for the air conditioner of the church house. We may not need it if this cool weather lasts. Schools are not out yet. They need to go three more weeks, then they will have summer vacation for 40 days. The attendance may go down during summer vacation. I have plans to hold summer vacation Bible school and family Bible camp. We would like for you to pray for us.



DANIEL

The book of Daniel is one that has never failed to excite interest. It has captivated readers with accounts of heroism in time of critical danger and comforted multitudes of God's faithful followers as they read stirring accounts of His presence and blessings.

The first chapters of Daniel relate certain experiences of Jewish youths, Daniel and his three friends, who are part of the Jewish captivity in Babylon in the sixth century B.C. Their refusal to be seduced by the pagan world in which they live and the dangers that threaten them because of their faithfulness are the essence of drama. Their deliverances, Daniel from the lions' den and Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego from the fiery furnace, demonstrate the power and love of God.

Nebuchadrezzar, proud and secure in his despotism, is brought low until he comes to brought low until he comes to recognize that God's providence rules even a monarch's life. The drama of "the handwriting on the wall" has made that phrase a proverbial part of our language to this present time. The dreadful sin of

arrogance toward God, of which Belshazzar was guilty, brings certain death and defeat. The contents' of the book hold our interest because of their revelance whenever materialism and paganism threaten to endanger the children of God.

The visions given in the book of Daniel, either to pagan rulers or to Daniel himself, are accounted by earnest Bible students to be a preview of the world throughout history and to the last days. Especially, in chapter 2, the telling of the kingdom which God would establish (church), verse 35, is called a "stone" at first and then the transition to "a great mountain" which would fill the whole earth, explains what is taught in Isaiah 2:2 and Micah 4:1. No mountain has ever become large enough to "fill the whole earth" but the "large mountain" referring to the "church" has filled the earth.

Historically both Judaism and Christendom have received Daniel into the canon as a genuine work of the period from which it alleges to speak, the sixth century B.C. written by Daniel
