Our title is extracted from 1 Corinthians 3:6, thus written: "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase."

To be a contemporary and cohort of the Apostle Paul attracts us to Apollos. I suppose the less revealed about a person, the more intriguing they become. Suppressing the imagination, we examine the scriptures:

(a) A Jew from Alexandria, a learned and mighty man in the (old) scriptures; (b) apparently a misplaced disciple of John the Baptist; (c) enlightened (more perfectly taught) as to the life, death and resurrection of Christ, and the events afterward; (d) he was a preacher - derived from Acts 18:24-28. From 1 Corinthians 3 we learn: (e) he labored at Corinth an undetermined time; and, (f) he (Continued on Page 3)

BIBLE LANDS TOUR

We had enough to fill two busses. With me as Host, I had Elder Paul Bryson, Co-Host and Bro. Windell Flippin, Co-Host and their groups. On Bus Two with their passengers were Elder Doug Curtis, Co-Host; Mr. Eddie Wright, Co-Host; Mrs. Essie Yaden, Co-Host; Elder Harold Carver, Co-Host, who is reporting for Bus Two; Mrs. Claudine Vanderpool, Co-Host; Mrs. Beatrice Petty, Co-Host. While we were on two busses, we did share the wonderful TRIP OF A LIFETIME! We were together at night, for our evening meals, fellowship and breakfast and fellowship in the mornings before boarding our busses for the day's travels.

Tuesday, October 25, 1983

While some of our people were travelling from Missouri, Arkansas, Ohio, Indiana and Louisville, Ky., to meet us in New York, we had one plane load and a few over out of Nashville. One of the great joys of hosting Bible Lands Tours is seeing our co-hosts and their people coming together and cooperating to make a wonderful trip for everyone. This we witnessed on the morning of our departure from the Nashville Airport.

We had a stop in Pittsburg, while those on the other plane out of Nashville stopped in Philadelphia. Upon arriving in New York at Kennedy International Airport a count was taken and I enjoyed a great sigh of relief when all 93 passengers were present, all passports accounted for and everyone anxious to board our Royal Jordanian Airline for Amman, Jordan.

Approximately 11:00 P.M. (EDT) we began our overseas flight on Flight 264, a 747 that lets one travel in comfort. Travelling from West to East, eight hours are lost between home and the Middle East. We were served a good dinner while in flight. It is always interesting to observe the various ways people pass the time on these flights. Some read, some walk about visiting more than others, while some talk, read, practice with the new camera they bought just before leaving home. This is the shortest night throughout the trip.

Wednesday, October 26, 1983

When the sun begins to rise over the Atlantic Ocean the folks back home are just getting settled in good for sleeping, which is a few hours before the country roosters crow. As the bright morning rays of sunshine penetrated our windows, our people began to stir around, walking, washing up and getting ready for breakfast.

After eating, the fellowship and excitement continued. After a few hours we landed in Vienna, Austria for a while but we did not deplane. We were allowed to go to the open door and make pictures of the countryside. This was our only stop between New York and Amman, Jordan.

A few hours later we noticed the dark shades of night falling and realized we were flying over the Middle East. We were soon told that we were approaching the Amman International Airport. Upon our arrival, we deplaned and to our surprise, our Wholesale Tours International representative guided us to our busses without having to go through the regular hustle of going through customs. (Another great blessing!)

From the airport we made our way into Amman to our hotel for the night. This was the Tyche Hotel. WTI's Jordanian representative met with me and the co-hosts to attend to the regular business of passports, visas, travel arrangement for the next morning, etc. We had a good and interesting meal. Rooms for all our passengers were already arranged and I'm sure most everyone was ready for a

was probably with or near Paul at the writing of this Epistle, ibid. 16:12.

He is again mentioned in Titus 3:13, but apart from these brief clues we know nothing of him. Tradition makes him to have been the Pastor at Caesarea.

In the Corinthian letter Paul and Apollos were compared - likewise, today comparisons are being made of the two. However, current day comparisons often magnify the one and de-emphasize the other. Therein we fault.

I believe our text is the basis whereby "watering the word" is implied to mean singing, testifying, etc. This "watering" is suggested to be useful but not essential. Now I take not issue with singing, testifying and the like, rather the implications of "watering" - particularly because in so doing, Apollos and his activity are degraded. In fact, the very ones intending to magnify preaching are in reality de-emphasizing it. Not to mention wilfully misapplying the scripture.

Allow me to clearly state my position. I firmly believe that God provided the scriptures that they may be utilized by the Holy Spirit in order for conversion. Furthermore, the church was constituted and commissioned to spread the Word, primarily by means of a divinely called ministry. I believe singing, testifying and prayer are of great service in the worship of God and the Christian's life. But one would but put to task to prove the latter essential to the conversion of souls.

As you see, my complaint is not with any of the above, but with the habit of hanging the "watering" title on singing and testifying. Therefore, that I may substantiate my opinion, we shall explore the context, 1 Cor. 3:5-8.

- 1. VERSE 7 The planter and waterer are on an equal plane. "Neither is he (either one of them) anything" when compared to God. If planting is preaching and singing is watering they are of equal importance.
- 2. VERSE 8 The planter and waterer "ARE ONE," that is, one in harmony of purpose; engaged in one work; employed by the same (one) Lord.
- 3. VERSE 6 The writer did not assume planting to be of greater need than watering. In fact, he placed God in the lead with all others trailing, or as verse 7 suggests - God is everything.
- 4. VERSE 5 The apostle asks and answers his own question: WHO IS PAUL? WHO IS APOLLOS? "But MINISTERS by whom ye believed . . .

CONCLUSION

Tis settled, Paul and Apollos were ministers, actively preaching the gospel around about Corinth. Souls were being saved as the Lord, in grace, granted faith.

The terminology - watered/planted - actually is a mere play-onwords, projecting an imaginary farming endeavor. Under such imagery, watering, being extended over the "season," must be accepted as equal, if not more important, than planting. Nonetheless, as far as the ministry of preaching is concerned, planting and watering are synonymous when appraising the laborer, purpose and results; and are merely used to illustrate the preaching of the gospel.

Finally, let the singers sing, the redeemed testify, and because pulpit time is valuable, let the preacher preach the Word and quit harping on a string apparently in need of tuning.

What is Christianity? In the home, it is kindness; in business, it is honesty; in society, it is courtesy; in work, it is thoroughness; in play, it is fairness; toward the fortunate, it is congratulation; toward the unfortunate, it is pity; toward the weak, it is help; toward the wicked, it is resistance; toward the strong, it is trust; toward the penitent, it is forgiveness; and toward God, it is reverence and love.

warm bath and a good night's rest. However, due to my book work and papers I got into bed about 11:00 P.M. I awoke about 2:00 A.M. (less than 3 hours of sleep) and could never go back to sleep. The excitement and tension on these travels keeps your eyes open quite a bit.

After staying up for sometime and sitting in my window watching the stars over Amman and listening to various sounds coming from within the city, I decided to stay up. My wife joined me in early rising, so we had plenty of time to get ready for the day.

We checked with our co-hosts and tour members to be sure everyone would be up in time for breakfast and getting our luggage out to be picked up. This is what they told us the night before. Morning call to get up will be at 5:00 A.M. Have your luggage outside your doors at 5:15 A.M. We will have breakfast at 5:30 A.M. and then be ready to get on our busses at 6:00 A.M. Now, can you beat that for speed? You can see why most of us wanted extra time to get up and get ready. We didn't have to get up that early on other mornings, but we were due to travel down to the Jordan River and cross the Allenby Bridge early before several busses of tourists arrived.

Thursday, October 27, 1983

Well, well, we made the schedule just given above. Early in the morning some of us were out walking, some meeting in the lobby of the hotel for fellowship, and some were out getting their morning's exercise. This made breakfast better.

After breakfast our luggage was loaded onto two busses and we got loaded on also and headed west across Jordan. We saw a lot of

the city of Amman and also many of the barren hills, valleys and mountains of Moab in eastern Jordan. We passed through routine checkpoints until we came to the Jordan River. There we went through customs and on the other side we found two large busses and our guides and drivers waiting to pick us up to begin our journey into the Promised Land. The guide for Bus 1 was Theo and the guide for Bus 2 was Zach. Zach was a Jew and Theo was an Arab. We have never had better guides in all our travels in Bible Lands than these two men. The drivers were excellent.

We drove north through the Jordan Valley. We passed through Jericho where we had a short stop because we were scheduled to make a more extensive tour of the city later. We travelled north then to Tiberias. Here at the Ginton Hotel where we were to stay that night, we had our lunch. After eating we went around the Sea of Galilee through Magdala, home of Mary Magdalene, and on to Capernaum. We went to the Mt. of Beatitudes. Here we had our first service. As we read scripture, sang and had prayer, the Spirit was manifested among us. What a glorious feeling to stand on the hills where Jesus stood, read His precious word, sing unto His great name and through tear-filled eyes gaze into the Jordan Valley and the Sea of Galilee.

We returned to Tiberias where we were to spend the night. In a little while Bus 2 arrived and we were ready for our evening meal and a good time of fellowship. While this hotel has been called the Ginton Hotel for a long time, the name is being changed to The Washington Hotel. We soon retired for the night.

In the early afternoon we boarded U.S. Air flight No. 16 for New York via Pittsburg and arrived at Kennedy International Airport in the early evening. We had approximately five hours in New York before our scheduled flight to Amman, Jordan. The time soon passed as it gave an opportunity for tour members to renew old friendships and establish new ones. At approximately 11:00 P.M. we boarded the Alia Royal Jordanian Airlines Boeing 747 for the flight to Amman, Jordan via Vienna, Austria. Finally aboard and airborne, the long flight was passed in various ways. Some slept, others read, and many of us were content just to relax and enjoy the excitement of the journey. We were well cared for while aloft. The Alia crew served refreshments and good food at frequent intervals.

Wednesday, October 26, 1983

At approximately 5:00 P.M. on the second day, October 26, 1983 we touched down in Amman to a spontaneous applause by all aboard. We were met by representatives of Wholesale Tours International and efficiently transferred to our hotel. A good dinner was waiting for the tour group which was enjoyed by all. It was early to bed and after a brief night's sleep the 5:00 A.M. wake-up call came introducing the third day.

Thursday, October 27, 1983

Following a continental breakfast we were off to begin the journey into and through the Holy Land. At approximately 6:30 A.M. we boarded the bus that would transfer the group across the Allenby Bridge to the Israeli Custom Center. Having passed through routine security checks we met our W.T.I. tour guide, Zachariah and driver, Rezek who would be with us while in Israel.

Following a warm welcome from our guide we were off to Masada.

On the way to Masada the route took us by the Dead Sea. Nearly 1300 feet below sea level, the Dead Sea is the world's lowest point. It is supplied by the Jordan River which flows from Mt. Hermon in Galilee. It is one of Israel's most valuable natural resources. Potash, magnesium, and bromide are in abundant supply.

By the Dead Sea and passing through the Jordan Valley we came to Qumran to visit the caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. Accidentally discovered, the parchment fragments from eleven separate caves have thrown great light on the history of Israel.

Leaving Qumran the tour stopped at Ein Gedi, where David spared the life of King Saul. It also was to the caves above Ein Gedi that David fled from Saul's wrath (I Samuel 24).

The next stop was Masada, the Palace fort built by King Herod. Masada rises 1400 feet above the Dead Sea shoreline; the table-top mountain stands as a tribute to Jewish resistance against Rome. The fortress was designed by Herod the Great to protect against his enemies. The fortress contained sufficient food and water storage to sustain her inhabitants for long periods of time. The end finally came in 73 A.D., when 960 Jewish Zealots committed suicide rather than surrender to the Romans. The tour descending the mountain via the cable car enjoyed lunch at Herod's Hole Restaurant.

Leaving Masada the next destination was the ancient city of Jericho. Upon arriving in Jericho, a desert oasis of lovely trees, date palms and vineyards, we stopped at The Tel where the walls

Anniversary Service

A service was held on Saturday night, October 15, 1983, at Union Missionary Baptist Church #1, near Fountain Run. Ky. to commemorate the 40th anniversary of Elder Rex Hunt's ministry. 
His daughter, Sandra, presented Elder Hunt with a cake in the shape of a Bible with his first text written on it.

attend the service of Christ in his Church in the ministry of the word, and prayer with watching for their souls as they that must give an account to Him; it is incumbent on the churches to whom they minister, not only to give them all due respect, but also to communicate to them of all their good things according to their ability...' (Acts 4:4; Hebrews 13:17; I Timothy 5:17-18; Galatians 6:6).

We have wondered why so many churches, and even not a few pastors, are so timid on the question of ministerial support, as nothing - no doctrine whatever - is more explicitly taught in the scriptures than the adequate support of the gospel preacher. Churches are often very careful as to the conduct of their members relative to other items of faith, or doctrines of

the Bible, and even in matters of less importance, but we have seldom known churches to call members to account for habitually neglecting to help defray church expenses.

We have known pastors to preach very earnestly for hours on Baptism, the Lord's Supper, the proper observance of the Sabbath and very many other things affecting Christian duty; but never a word about the support of the gospel. Why all this? Why leave out this one great question? Why demand that every applicant for church membership shall be a penitant, have faith in Christ, be baptized, etc., etc., and then keep such an one in the church for years, while he positively neglects, and, in thousands of cases, refuses to contribute even to the support of his pastor. It is an outrage upon the Christian name - an encouragement to infidelity.

This is a question that the Old Path Association, and some if not all, of her churches were not afraid to handle. As an illustration of this we cite an event which occurred at a meeting in 1877. One of the ministers had been silenced from preaching on the grounds of opposition to ministerial support, denouncing ministers who received renumeration for labor as 'hirelings,' etc. The case was carried to the association in 1877, the action of the church was sustained, and the man's name was dropped from the list of ministers.

The effort was renewed in 1878 and a motion made to rescind the action of the preceding year, which after a long discussion was lost, and the friends of the deposed minister failed to secure his restoration. Why not revoke a preacher's credentials for opposition to ministerial support as unhesitatingly as for opposition to any other plain precept of the Holy Bible?"

I, Jerry Reynolds, was born and reared within the bounds of the Old Path Association here referred to. She and several sister associations and churches about her are yet stedfastly maintaining the basics of the faith of Christ while hundreds of churches all about her have departed from their former soundness. Yet despite such a commendation, there is not to my knowledge an adequately supported minister of the gospel in that entire region at this present day.

The Association's action of 1877 apparently did little that carried down to the present. Instead, I grew up being instructed that preachers ought to make their own livings for themselves and their families. I have known of a few preachers bragging about never having been chargeable to any church, and never having preached at any time on the subject of money. This I believed to be right, by the force of tradition and the one example from the Bible always given to defend that tradition, Paul's example of

This practice became a distinguishing mark of our ministry and something we sometimes proudly (but vainly) boasted against the "modern" Baptists of our area. It is no wonder that I and many other young men and boys of our churches lived in stark terror of the call to preach. The burden that was heaped upon these magnificently Spiritual men in long-sleeved white shirts was awesome. It was amazing to see the transformation from plowman to preacher in preparation for God's work. Some served churches (from one to four) as pastor while half the year they were almost continually engaged in revival meeting efforts, sometimes twice a day, and yet they managed to derive the majority of their income from the work of their own hands even as others.

Supermen they were, I thought, and no less marvelous were their wives who often stayed home and did a man's work in addition to her own so her husband could serve as slave not only to God but also to his unthoughtful people. One could not help admire them, but no one wanted to be like them. With our minds we honored them, but not with our purses. We had not learned from the scriptures their true meaning, that when in obedience to God the "elders that rule well (among us) are counted worthy of double honor" (I Timothy 5:17) their bills are paid by us, thus relieving the slaves of Christ of the necessity of being a slave to the dollar also.

If we had understood the next verse of the Apostle's letter to Timothy we would not have dishonored the "ox that treadeth out the corn" by muzzling him nor withheld the wages of "the laborer (who) is worthy of his reward.'

One of the most outstanding revivalists of our region became disabled a number of years before he died and was forced to quit preaching. Shortly before he died he replied to one who had commended his life's work, "I sure had a hard time getting people saved." We had no idea! He had made it

A central location was one main consideration and Gallatin seemed to be the number one choice. One of the considerations taken under advisement was to purchase land suitable for buildings and parking, and construct the buildings as needed.

It was suggested that those present return to their churches and discuss the matter with the churches and meet again to get a better understanding of the desires and wishes of our people.

An invitation was extended by Long View Missionary Baptist Church, Spencer and Elleta St., in Gallatin to meet with them. There was a unanimous vote to accept the invitation. The meeting is to be Monday night, February 6, 1984 at 7 P.M.
